

Deteriorating resident case study



Edgar is 75 years old with a history of angina, high blood pressure and type 2 diabetes, managed with diet and medication. He has dementia, walks by himself and is known to wander.

He has been lashing out and is agitated. He has been dribbling small amounts of urine, which isn't normal for him. He has been doubled over in a chair, rubbing his stomach. He looks clammy and pale.

- What signs of deterioration is Edgar showing?
- ☐ How would you report this using *CUS*?

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Deteriorating resident case study

Eden is 85 years old with a history of osteoarthritis, cardiac failure and mild stroke. She wears glasses and a hearing aid. Eden is cognitive but forgetful at times. She uses a wheelchair and needs help to go to the toilet. She is frail and thin.

Over the last few days, Eden has not been eating or drinking. She seems more tired than usual and is not interested in her normal activities. Eden won't get out of bed by herself as she usually does. She is slurring some words and the right side of her body is moving less. She says she is in pain and can't get comfortable.

Deteriorating resident case study



Edwin is 77 years old with a history of angina, high blood pressure and type 2 diabetes which is managed with diet and medication. He has dementia, walks without help and is known to wander.

This morning Edwin has coughed up green sputum. His chest is noisy when he breathes, and he is agitated. He cannot walk far before needing to stop and catch his breath.

- What signs of deterioration is Edwin showing?

Deteriorating resident case study

Edna is 82 years old with a history of osteoarthritis, cardiac failure and type 1 diabetes. She wears glasses, uses a wheelie walker and needs help to go to the toilet. She is usually very social, participating in many activities.

Over the last few days, Edna has not felt like eating or drinking. She seems more tired than usual and is not interested in her normal activities. She's talking to herself and says she sees ants which are not there.

This morning, Edna won't get out of bed.

Deteriorating resident case study



Edwina is 85 years old with a history of osteoarthritis, cardiac failure and mild stroke. She wears glasses and hearing aids, walks with a wheelie walker and requires help to go to the toilet. She returned from hospital yesterday where she had a colonoscopy.

You notice Edwina is unsteady on her feet and keeps getting up to go to the toilet without her wheelie walker or asking for help. She seems restless and anxious about getting to the toilet.
